

Pain management recommendations

Available over the counter:

Ibuprofen: 400 or 600 mg (two or three 200 mg tablets) by mouth
every 6 hours for the first day or two after your tooth extraction.
After the first two days, take the same dose every 6 hours
as needed for pain or swelling.

Acetaminophen: 500 mg by mouth every 6 hours for the first day or two after your tooth extraction. After the first two days, take the same dose every 6 hours as needed for pain.

What you should know about prescription opioids for short-term pain

- Using an opioid can cause side effects such as constipation, tiredness, nausea, or itchiness. Longer-term use can lead to addiction.
- Opioids are rarely needed after most dental procedures. If prescribed, they should be used only for a short time, usually less than 3 days.
- Store in a safe, secure location.
- Stop taking opioids as soon as possible.
- Discard any unused tablets or pills:
 - Bring to a collection site such as a secure dropbox or take-back event.
 - Flush down the toilet.
